How to Greet a Dog (and What to Avoid)

Appropriate greetings are common sense. Imagine if someone greeted you the way many people greet dogs!

Avoid reaching your hand out for the dog to sniff. Avoid reaching into personal space. Let the dog approach at his own rate.
